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Grief is unpredictable. Ambushing you over small events, like finding a pair of your wife's socks, or a scarf at the back of a drawer. It is visceral and unrelenting in its affect. But it is also always physically there. I wrote this text to give words to what I was experiencing, and continue to experience.

This piece is made up of image and text screen-printed over one another and then made into a simple folded book.

The image references the landscape of grief, the unpredictability and the output of monitors in hospitals which measure life.
